#### Organized:

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### WHY?

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### HOW?

- Adaptation of the material to the local context; translation
- 3 teaching days in the center of Krakow: Friday-Sunday
- 20 hours + reception time + official dinner
- Additional bonus: unexpected flamenco lesson (sic!)
- On-line evaluation
- Re-thinking the content

























#### **HOW? - ADAPTATION**

- Focused on searching the statistical, demographical and epidemiological data on MEM groups in Poland, their health status, health services utilisation, good practices etc.
- Other issues: legal status, legal acts, human rights regulations in Poland
- Bibliography in Polish/concerning Polish problems related to MEM groups
- Polish video as an exemple of health mediation for female patient from Asia giving birth in Polish hospital

#### **RESULTS**

- 28 participants, 3 absent, more on the official and unofficial waiting lists (also staff playing role in administration of health units, ex. director of emergency unit of a hospital)
- The combination of different professions and profiles was very enriching for our programme.
- Evaluation and modification of training materials: May-July 2015
- Presentation of the project on the Conference co-organised by our Faculty (Institute of Nursing) - September 2015

























#### **RESULTS**

- Physicians, nurses and midwife participating in the training received educational points.
- Emergency professionals did not because there was no any official examination (there is a separate regulation on this issue in Poland).
- All participants received two types of certifications: the certification of participating in the MEM-TP project and the diploma issued by the Medical Center for Continuing Medicine.

















### **REMARQUES**

- Very good "role" of role playing and other "active" activities, including home work (seraching for videos and other useful materials)
- Very important role of exchanging experiences
- Orientation towards social issues, ex. intersectionality found a little bit more difficult

Lack of systematic data for Polish content (epidemiology)























### **REMARQUES**

- The content very interesting but too long for 20 hours in 3 days the necessity of making the choice.
- It was a good idea to ask a sociologist as one of teachers for module 1.
- It was very good to have the possibility of changing the sequence of modules/units: in some cases we had to do it beacuse of teacher availability.
- Online evaluation was not an important issue for the partcipants is this a cultural question? but we had some spoken feedback during the breaks.



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














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
