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A challenge for the Region?

77 millions of migrants are living in the WHO European Region, 8% of its population



1 in 12 residents is a migrant



1.100.000 refugees and migrants crossed the Mediterranean in 2015 so far



Increasing number of families with young children, pregnant women and elderly



Migration associated to emergency situations: conflicts, economic crises, natural disasters, manmade disasters, climate changes





Refugee and migrant health, a challenge for the WHO European Region

- Responding quickly and efficiently to large-scale migration can be complex, resource-intensive and potentially socially disruptive if health systems are not fully prepared.
- Large arrivals of refugees and migrants have an impact on:
 - The management of communicable diseases.
 - The management of non-communicable diseases.
 - The capacity and readiness of health systems.
- The health needs of refugees and migrants must be integrated into national health policies, strategies and plans.



Guiding principles

Responding to the needs of refugees and migrants implies acting on the basic European values as laid down in Health 2020, such as health as a human right, dignity, solidarity and protection of the vulnerable.

Review of SDH and health divide in the WHO Europe

Health 2020

The focus should be placed on:

- The approaches required to meet the different short and medium term health needs of refugees and migrants.
- The response to immediate health requirements of large arrivals.
- The long-term provision of health care for those who remain in host countries.
- The health needs of host populations.



Building on the experience of the WHO European Region

- The proposed strategy, action plan and resolution will build on:
 - The implementation of the project 'Public Health Aspects of Migration in Europe' (PHAME), created in 2012 with the financial support of the Ministry of Health of Italy.
 - The PHAME experience gathered through the work in Mediterranean and South Eastern European counties.
 - Other initiatives of the WHO Regional Office for Europe such as the work done in the Gaziantep office, located on the border between Turkey and Syria.



Key areas of action

- The WHO European strategy and action plan on refugee and migrant health will support MS development of national health policies aligned with H2020.
- They will also identify the priority actions needed in the following areas:
 - Addressing the challenges of communicable diseases.
 - Addressing the challenges of non-communicable diseases.
 - Strengthening the capacity of the health systems to adapt to refugee and migrant health needs.
 - Improving health information on refugee and migrant health.
 - Addressing the social, cultural, economic and environmental determinants of the health of refugees and migrants.



High Level meeting on Refugee and Migrant Health in Rome, 23-24 November

- Participants: Ministries of Health of 44 European countries, 3 Eastern Mediterranean countries and 3 African countries; UN agencies and international organizations.
- Outcome document: Stepping up action on refugee and migrant health Towards a WHO
 European framework for collaborative action.
- Rational, agenda and framework for action on public health and migration.
- Focus on the health needs of refugees and migrants, as well as the host population, according to population health and human rights principles.
- Key issues: strengthening of surveillance; cross-border sharing of health data; improvement of evidence and communication to avoid misconceptions; focus on NCDs, mental health; improvement of coordination between countries, UN agencies and international organizations, etc.
- Basis for the development of regional policy documentation, to be submitted to RC66.
